CERTIFICATE III in HEALTH SERVICE ASSISTANCE

Ms Barbara is currently conducting this course :-

My name is **Barbara Deery** and this year, I am excited to bring a new skills training package to Djarragun. This course is Certificate III in Health Service Assistance and provides a range of essential skills and knowledge for healthcare workers who provide support to the staff who care for clients/patients in the hospital environment.

Working as a healthcare assistant

Healthcare assistants can work within hospital or community settings under the guidance of a qualified healthcare professional. The role can be very varied depending upon the area in which the person is employed. There are many employment opportunities for health support staff in public and private hospitals, health care services and aged care facilities. Job roles include health support worker, patient services assistant/attendant, ward assistant and orderly.

The course will provide the foundations of health care, anatomy and physiology, medical terminology and client/patient care. With this foundation, students may then move on to further studies in the health industry. Already, without meeting the full class, the wonderful students that I have met include 2 x future doctors, 2 x future nurses; 2 x future midwives; 2 x future indigenous Health Workers wanting ot take their knowledge home to their islands and communities and 1 x future neuro (brain) surgeon. WOW !! how exciting is that? so, I''m sure we can look forward to an exciting and fun filled year of new beginnings and I look forward to getting to know you all better and being part of the Djarragun team. Mark Christensen recently visited the school to provide some workshopping and support service for the implementation of his software into our school programme :-

"I have been doing PD sessions with teachers involved in the ISQ Math program. Teachers incorporate the math continuum and our software "Fun With Construction" complements this. The software is non-content based so it encourages students to create their own knowledge and represent problems in a graphical manner. The students find answers and solutions through exploratory learning.

Another advantage of this particular type of software is that it allows teachers to use it as a demonstration tool and as it is non-content based and manipulatable, the teacher is not restricted a set of answer types. They are free to use the tools to explain the concept in their own way.

We hope by using the software in conjunction with the ISQ Math Continuum, students will increase their ability in open ended thinking and tackle problems at a higher cognitive level. They will gain the ability to think about problems in new ways and construct their own knowledge and methods of solving problems."
